Superintendent's Message

This spring, we were able to experience success at the state level in boys soccer, girls tennis, and girls track & field. There were many exciting moments throughout each season and these were some of the highlights from Spring Post Season: The boys soccer team was able to take down Toppenish, the number one team in the state when it mattered most, on the way to a 3rd place finish in the 1A state soccer tournament. The girls track team sent Niveah Martinez (1600m run), Nevaeh Roman (Discus), Gwen Rydberg (Shot Put), and Lupita Silva (1600m run) to state where Roman finished seventh and Rydberg finished 4th. 





Immunization Record Requirements

Starting August 1, 2020, all immunization records turned in to schools or child care centers are required by state law to be medically verified. Immunization records must be turned into the school on or before the first day of attendance. This means immunization records turned in to the school must be from a health care provider, or you must attach paperwork from a health care provider to your handwritten form that shows your child's records are accurate. Your child cannot attend school until you provide these records.

Here are some examples of medically verified immunization records:

- A completed <u>Certificate of Immunization Status (CIS)</u> signed by a health care provider. Find the CIS form by visiting <u>https://www.doh.wa.gov/SCCI</u> and clicking on "Certificate of Immunization Status."
- A CIS filled out by you or another parent/guardian with medical records attached.
- A CIS printed by a health care provider or school from the Washington State Immunization Information System.
- A CIS printed from MyIR which is a free Department of Health online tool that allows families to view and print their official immunization records themselves. Go to https://wa.myir.net/register to begin the sign-up process.

If you are requesting an exemption from one or more of the immunization requirements, you must provide the school a completed Certificate of Exemption.

Starting on August 1, 2020 the Tdap school requirement is changing to start at 7th grade to better align with the updated 2019 national immunization schedule (https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/schedules/hcp/imz/child-adolescent.html). In the past the Tdap booster was required starting at 6th grade.

For the 2020-2021 school year all students attending grades 7 through 12 must have had one dose of Tdap vaccine:

- For students in 7th grade, the Tdap vaccine must be given at or after age 10 to be accepted for school entry.
- For students in 8th to 12th grades, the Tdap vaccine must be given at or after age 7 to be accepted for school entry.

If your child already meets immunization requirements and has records on file with the school, you do not need to do anything. If you aren't sure, or if you have any questions, please contact the nurse. Please note that there is no longer an automatic 30 day conditional period from the first day of school.

Requisitos para los registros de vacunación

A partir del 1 de agosto del 2020, la ley estatal requiere que todos los registros de vacunación entregados a las escuelas o centros de cuidado infantil sean verificados médicamente. Los registros de vacunación deben entregarse a la escuela el primer día de asistencia escolar o antes. Esto significa que los registros de vacunación entregados a las escuelas deben provenir de un proveedor de atención médica, o usted debe adjuntar documentación de un proveedor de atención médica a su formulario escrito a mano que muestre que los registros de su hijo/a son los correctos. Su hijo/a no puede asistir a la escuela hasta que proporcione estos registros.

Estos son algunos ejemplos de registros de vacunación médicamente verificados:

- Un <u>Certificado de Estado de Vacunación (CEV)</u> completo y firmado por un proveedor médico. Encuentre una copia de este certificado en línea en <u>www.doh.wa.gov/SCCI</u>. Busque el documento que diga "Certificate of Immunization Status (CIS)", haga clic y busque la copia en español.
- Un CEV (CIS, por sus siglas en inglés) completado por usted u otro padre o tutor legal con registros médicos adjuntos.
- Un CEV impreso por un proveedor médico o una escuela usando el Sistema Informático de Vacunación del estado de Washington.
- Un CEV impreso desde el portal MyIR (en inglés), una herramienta gratuita en línea del Departamento de Salud que permite a las familias ver e imprimir sus registros oficiales de vacunación. Visite https://wa.myir.net/register (en inglés) para iniciar su proceso de registro.

Si solicita una exención para uno o más de los requisitos de vacunación, debe proporcionarle a la escuela un Certificado de exención completo.

A partir del 1 de agosto del 2020, el requisito escolar para la vacuna Tdap cambiará empezando con el séptimo grado escolar para alinearse mejor con el calendario actualizado de vacunación nacional del 2019 (http://bit.ly/CDC-alendario-de-vacunas). Anteriormente se requería un refuerzo de la vacuna Tdap a partir del sexto grado escolar. Para el año escolar 2020-2021, todos los estudiantes asistiendo del grado séptimo al doceavo deben haber recibido una dosis de la vacuna Tdap:

- Para los estudiantes en el séptimo grado escolar, la vacuna Tdap debe administrarse a partir de los 10 años para poder ser aceptada y poder ingresar a la escuela.
- Para los estudiantes del octavo al doceavo grado escolar, la vacuna Tdap debe administrarse a partir de los 7 años para poder ser aceptada y poder ingresar a la escuela. Si su hijo/a cumple con los requisitos de vacunación y tiene registros en los archivos de la escuela, no necesita hacer nada por ahora. Si no está seguro o si tiene alguna pregunta, comuníquese con la enfermera.

- Students must get vaccine doses at correct timeframes to be in compliance with the requirements. Talk to your helathcare provider or school staff if you have questions about school immunization requirements.


