

From the desk of the Superintendent...

Greetings from the Highland School District! I want to heartily thank the Highland Community for your support in the recent passing of our Capital Projects Levy. With a 62% approval, we hear you loud and clear that Highland is a great place to live and Highland School District is the best place for your students. The next step in the Capital Projects process will be to hold meetings with the Board and with the Community Facilities Committee to refine the priority list of projects, develop a timeline and begin the process for obtaining estimates and bids.

Highland School District will continue to follow the directive by Governor Inslee and the DOH with masking being optional for students and staff in school buildings, which started on March 12th. Students (per their parents/guardians) have the choice to wear a mask or not at school with the expectation that those choices will be respected. The Highland School District will not tolerate bullying or harassment of any kind for those who choose to either continue wearing a mask or wish to stop wearing masks while at school.

Winter Intersession was disappointing due to the weather forcing a cancellation of four out of the five scheduled days. We were able to hold class on only one day and had about a 50% turnout of those that had signed up. Spring Intersession, however, was a great week of alternate learning, fun and games. Fifty+ teachers, paras, and bus drivers worked together to make it a successful week for the 400+ students that chose to participate. Superintendents, principals, and teachers from 16 area school districts visited during the week to learn first-hand how Highland runs our intersession and all expressed enthusiasm and admiration for our program. A few expressed regret that their district hadn't yet implemented a similar option. We are proud to be leading the way in providing diverse and supportive educational opportunities for our students.



Message from the MWC Principal



Hello everyone! As we enter the spring season, we are entering into the final stretch of our 2021-2022 school year. We have had a fabulous year so far as it has been full of engaging events and tons of learning for our students. There is still lots for us to look forward to in the coming months. Please continue to look for the Scottie News that comes home every month to learn all about the different events we have going on in the building.

Kindergarten registration for the 2022-2023 school year has officially opened! In order for your child to be eligible for the 2022-2023 school year, they must turn 5 on or before August 31st. Registration is available online through Final Forms. To set up your account, go to our website and click on the Final Forms link in the Student Enrollment window. If you need help, please call the office and they can help you set up your account. Once your child is registered, we have a kinder-ready packet with activities you can do with your child.

Kinder Orientation will be May 24th at 6:00 PM at Marcus Whitman. At orientation you will get to meet the kindergarten teachers as they introduce themselves, have a tour of the building, and engage in a few learning activities throughout the evening.

Pre-school registration is also open for the 2022-2023 school year, your child must turn 4 on or before August 31st. Please call the Marcus Whitman office to discuss registering your preschooler for next school year at (509) 678-8900.

Our 3rd grade students will be taking part in the Smarter Balanced Assessment (SBAC) this year to demonstrate their knowledge in the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). The students will take the Math portion of the test, to be given on May 24th - 27th. The ELA (English Language Arts – Reading, Writing, Listening) portion of the test will be on June 7th - 10th. It is critical that all students are in attendance on those days and are prepared to be successful on the assessments. Things you can do at home to make sure they are ready include;

- 1) make sure they get plenty of sleep,
- 2) make sure they eat good meals the days leading up to these dates, especially the night before and the morning of,
- 3) make sure they drink plenty of water,
- 4) make sure they watch limited amounts of TV, and
- 5) make sure they get plenty of exercise.

These items are proven techniques for improving brain function and higher-level thinking skills.

Thank you for taking the time to support and stay involved in your student's education. We look forward to the rest of the 2021-2022 school year.




DECA Returns to St

- Message from the HIH Principal

Hello from Highland Junior High!

The first half of our school year went very well. I am proud of students and staff efforts to provide a safe and caring learning environment. We continually discuss our schoolwide expectations, and have focused this year on maintaining safe behavior, respecting others, and our social-emotional health. I am also grateful for all efforts to return to a somewhat normal school year! Students and staff have managed this lofty task very well.

I want to encourage all families to support student attendance in school daily. When students are absent, it not only impacts that student's performance, but it impacts the class and other students. Each student absence impacts the daily lesson and flow in class.

Below are some additional facts about attendance in school:

- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, regular and high attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Missing 10 percent, or 18 days, of the school year can drastically affect a student's academic success.

As we move into spring, please support your student in meeting HJH dress code expectations also. Please know we have student clothing expectations to provide a productive school learning environment. We do not have student clothing expectations because we like to make rules for young people! Any clothing or personal appearance that disrupts the learning of others will not be permitted. The guidelines below are intended to help parents and students ensure that they are dressed in a manner which is appropriate at school. Please be aware of HJH student clothing expectations:

- Clothing should be appropriate for a school or workplace setting that promotes a positive atmosphere. Clothing should cover skin between fingertips (when arms are fully extended) and upper chest. Underwear and bras should be covered by clothing.
- Hats and head coverings may be permissible, but students must meet staff expectations.
- Appropriate footwear should be worn at all times.
- Clothing that substantially disrupts the school environment, violates the rights of others, is lewd (crude or sexually offensive), or displays alcohol, drugs or tobacco should not be worn at school.
- Students are allowed to wear one item of blue or red clothing.

Message from the HHS Principal

It appears that a much-anticipated spring is well on its way. We are fortunate to live in a community that really showcases the beauty of nature, especially during spring. Through all of the uncertainty of a pandemic, along with all of the safety and health requirements and protocols that have taken a major role in our school year, I believe our school year has been very productive so far and we hope to continue this momentum after a much-needed spring break the first full week of April. With Governor Inslee's lifting of the indoor mask requirement, we look forward to seeing a few faces that we haven't seen in a while. Although no longer required, students and staff may still choose to wear a mask and we will continue to follow the recommendations provided by the Department of Health. I truly appreciate all of the hard work by our staff and students as we focus on teaching and learning, even in very unusual circumstances.

For our spring conferences this year, we are going with our usual district-wide format, which means we will have half-days of school to accommodate conferences during the afternoon and evening the week of March 21-25. These conferences are student-led. During conferences, you will be able to meet with your student's advisor to review their academic progress thus far and discuss your student's scheduling options for next year and their high school and beyond plans. We greatly appreciate your attendance at conferences. It reinforces your support of your child's education. Your input helps us provide the best academic opportunities for our students. Research shows that student achievement and success increase exponentially when parents frequently take time to talk with their students about what they are learning, encourage them to make time to study daily, and share with them the importance of a quality education. Conferences are also a great time to connect with teachers if you have questions or feedback to help them provide the best learning environment for your children. However, if you feel there is a need to talk with teachers before conferences, please reach out to them. Early communication is a key to deal with issues before they become more serious and help us be more proactive.

Following our spring conference week, Highland High School will provide an optional intersession week on March 28th-April 1st. This is the third intersession week held this year. Students that register can choose from a variety of enrichment, elective, and credit recovery opportunities taught by members of our staff. These classes will run from 9 AM to 12:45 PM each day and transportation will be available. However, breakfast and lunch are not served on these days. Spring Break is April 4th-8th, 2022.

Spring also means that state testing is on the horizon. While there are several different graduation pathways to help more students meet graduation requirements, required state testing is still a main component to help students demonstrate their learning and proficiency. All Highland High School 10th grade students and 11th and 12th grade students that have yet to demonstrate proficiency will take the Smarter Balanced Assessment (SBA) beginning on June 1st through June 7th. The test includes an ELA test (English/ Language Arts) and a math test. A passing score on all of these state tests meets the requirements of the new graduation pathways. The Washington Comprehensive Assessment of Science (WCAS) will be taken by all 11th grade students on May 25th. As with any high-stakes testing, this can be a time of extra anxiety and stress for students. It is important that they eat properly and get plenty of rest to be able to maximize their testing performance. Students that miss any of the testing dates will be required to make it up. If possible, please make sure your students are in school during our testing dates.

We continually look for ways to provide the best education possible for our students and to communicate effectively with all stakeholders. Your feedback on how we can improve is always welcome. I invite you to stop in or call 678-8800 to share your thoughts. I appreciate the opportunity to work with your students and the wonderful teachers at Highland High School. Be proud to be a Scottie!

Participation numbers for spring sports are the best we've seen since the beginning of COVID two years ago, as nearly 120 student-athletes are participating in baseball, golf, boys soccer, tennis and track & field. Reminder from the School Nurses

<u>Documentation of the Tdap vaccine or an exemption must be turned before your child can start 7th grade.</u>


If we do not receive documentation prior to the start of school, by law, we must send you a Notice of Exclusion for Immunization Noncompliance. This will explain that your child cannot attend school until you provide the required immunization documentation, RCW 28A.210.120. Valid documentation includes medical records showing vaccination or a completed Certificate of Exemption (COE) form. Contact District RN Scott Podruzny at MWC or District LPN Tricia Roy at TIS if you have any questions.

<u>La documentación de la vacuna Tdap o una exención debe presentarse antes de que su hijo pueda comenzar el séptimo grado.</u>

Si no recibimos la documentación antes de la fecha de vencimiento indicada anteriormente, por ley debemos enviarle un aviso de exclusión por no cumplir con los requisitos de inmunización. Este aviso explicará que su hijo/a no puede asistir a la escuela / preescolar / cuidado de niños hasta que usted proporcione la documentación de vacunación requerida, de acuerdo al RCW (código revisado de Washington) 28A.210.120. Una documentación válida incluye registros médicos que muestran que su hijo/a ha sido vacunado/a, evidencia de inmunidad a la enfermedad en cuestión o un Certificado de Exención (COE, por sus siglas en inglés) completo. COMPLAINTS CONCERNING STAFF OR PROGRAMS

The District has developed procedures under separate policies to be followed in processing concerns specifically related to the following: (1) rights of individuals with disabilities, (2) concerns regarding learning materials, (3) cases of alleged sex discrimination and (4) sexual harassment complaints. Persons having concerns in one of these four areas are encouraged to seek assistance from the Superintendent's office in identifying appropriate procedures.

We recognize most complaints can be resolved directly by informal discussions between the person having a concern and the individual staff member involved. However, if this does not adequately address the issue, the next step would be to contact the administrator/principal of the building for assistance in addressing the issue. If still unresolved, contact may be made with the superintendent and then the school board. These steps are more fully discussed in School Board Procedure 4220P which can be accessed at: http://www.highland.wednet.edu/ District Information/School Board and District Policies


